Parish Council News

This really is a year of extremes in many ways. The weather has been very variable, with the monsoon earlier in the year, followed by a very hot dry period. This did have the advantage of allowing the land to eventually dry out. More recently, there has been an alternating pattern between high temperatures and heavy showers. Fortunately, our area has been largely spared the very violent thunderstorms. Just to add to the variety, the recent gale produced winds that taxed gardeners somewhat. The great storm in the South in 1987 caused much damage to woodland as the trees were in full leaf and the ground wet. However, there were much fewer tree casualties here on this occasion. Either the ground was drier, the winds lighter, or Yorkshire trees like Yorkshire folk, have a firmer grip on things. I prefer the latter explanation!

Friends of Moor End

There are a number of house keeping tasks in the Moor End nature reserve that could be undertaken by volunteers. For example there is currently a pile of chipped wood that could be spread on the footpath at the Well Lane end of Moor End. It has been suggested that a "friends" group be set up to look after the lighter maintenance tasks and to take an interest in preserving and improving this valuable habitat. Any work will be undertaken in a manner meeting social distancing rules of course. It is not intended to take on heavier or more challenging tasks which will still be undertaken by contractors paid by the Parish Council.

Volunteers

The Parish Council would like to thank all the volunteers who provided help to members of the local community during the lockdown and since. Their contribution is very much appreciated. The take away meal service by Neil and Nikki at the Rose and Crown also provided valuable assistance to the community during a difficult period.

Footpaths

Our thanks to all those residents who attacked the grass growing over the footpaths during the lockdown. There was immediate benefit in terms of the increase in width and neat appearance, although it is recognised that the exposed surface often left much to be desired. The next stage is to continue to pester Highways to re-surface the (wider) paths. It will be a lengthy battle to get some action on this as North Yorkshire County Council Highways are short of funds as are most Councils at present. However, we will persevere.


Vehicle Activated Sign

Further progress on the project to purchase and use a mobile vehicle activated sign (MVAS) at three sites in the village was delayed by the lockdown as the chosen company could not provide training to the volunteers and was concentrating on more essential traffic work. The original plan was to alternate the unit between three sites, monitoring traffic speeds in both directions. This would result in the unit being located on each site for 12 weeks or more to the point, being absent from each site for 24 weeks.

The North Yorkshire Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner’s office has recently invited applications for grants for projects related to road safety. The Parish Council has applied for match funding to support our MVAS project. There is no guarantee of a successful outcome, but should extra funding be available, it will be possible to purchase two units and increase frequency of deployment at each site. A decision should be available at the end of September and we have delayed purchase action until we know the outcome.

The unit we are planning to purchase also has a facility to download information regarding the frequency of speeds exceeding the limit, allowing an estimate to be made of the impact of the unit’s presence over time.

We currently have two volunteers willing to help with deployment of the MVAS, but it would be helpful to have more. The units are re-aligned/re-located every six weeks and this takes no more than one hour. If you are able to help, please contact the Parish Clerk or one of the Parish Councillors. This system is intended to complement Speedwatch, not replace it.

Speedwatch also desperately needs extra volunteers if it is to effectively maintain its operation in the village. If you are willing to help with this activity please contact -

Please take your bags home if they are unused. Discarded bags do not rot and we do not want even more plastic waste in the environment.

There is no dog poo fairy godmother in this village. The last one wore out her magic wand due to over work and we are unlikely to recruit another so bag it and bin it please.





Harvest Traffic



It is Harvest time and inevitably there is an increase in agricultural and heavy goods traffic on local roads. Please take care when crossing roads, parking, and exiting parked cars, particularly with young children.

Some residents have complained that large vehicles tend to speed, particularly in Main Street. In fact evidence from Speedwatch suggests that the combination of size and noise tends to give an impression of excessive speed whereas the vehicles are complying with the legal speed limit. Whether the actual speed is always appropriate to the location and loading is a different question.

Residents also ask why enforcement action (MVAS or Speedwatch) is not available in other locations. However, the individual locations have to be approved by the controlling authorities and our proposals are not always accepted.

Things come to those who wait

The road sign at the junction of Well Lane and Carr Lane has been broken and drooping for several years and reported many times. However, when nobody was looking a brand new shiny three armed sign has appeared. It even points in the right direction. Well done Highways.

Notice of A.G.M.

Our A.G.M. (postponed from April) will be held on **Tuesday 22nd September** at 7 p.m. in the hall. All residents are welcome to attend (subject to a maximum of 25 people in the hall!!)

We were delighted when Pre-School was able to restart in June and have been busy preparing to allow other groups to be able to return after the summer break. This has involved reading and producing reams of paperwork to comply with government guidelines in ensuring that we are 'Covid-19 secure' and minimise the risk of infection. Anyone hiring the hall will be given written guidance which hopefully is only common sense and not too off-putting. We have obtained quantities of hand sanitiser, disinfectant spray and general cleaning materials for hirers to use, gloves, extra bins and a Covid first aid box. Inevitably there will be rules on social distancing, meaning we can host a maximum of 25 people and I am afraid that face-coverings will be necessary.

We had booked two theatre performances for later in the autumn but sadly, at the time of writing, live performances are not allowed. Such a shame, especially having missed The DIY Chef in May, but we can always hope.

Having the hall empty has, however, given the opportunity to catch up on a lot of necessary maintenance. The white woodwork outside has been repainted, a number of areas of rotten wood replaced and a new window fitted to replace one that was beyond repair. Inside, the cleaning cupboard has new flooring (thanks, once again, to John Smale). The alder tree on the Carr Lane side of the building is dead and needs to come down which is not proving easy to arrange as it is close to overhead wires as well as the road and will involve Northern Power Grid.

Recent Shop Improvements

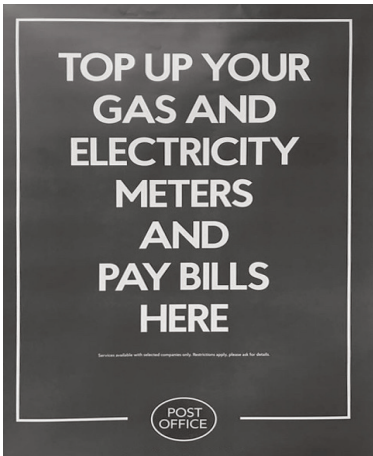
One of our huge challenges is finding space to store stock. The shop is small and we don’t have storage freezers and fridges to top up the main shop fridges. We are also having to manage social distancing on the forecourt, and continue to restrict 2 customers at a time inside the shop. This makes managing deliveries and stock very difficult for our volunteers.

At the beginning of October we will be replacing the various sheds and fruit and veg shed/gazebo with a purpose built shed on the forecourt which will include fridges and freezers, stock shelves and a separate section for fruit and veg. We have used a temporary small shed for one fridge and freezer during the summer and couldn’t have kept the shop supplied without it. Obviously, nothing of value is/will be kept in the shed.

The Management Committee is continuing to explore all options to purchase our own shop premises at some point and improve accessibility and storage, so the storage shed is meant to be a short-term solution to an everyday problem for us at the moment.

Our till system was replaced at the end of July as we had just about worn out the original EPOS used for the last 5 years. We also bought a new laptop and printer for the office to make it easier for everyone to print forms, signs and pie labels.

A touchless hand-sanitiser unit next to the shop steps is being well used by customers before coming into the shop.



Thank You to all Our Volunteers

Without our wonderful volunteers we would not be able to keep the shop open. Without the income from the shop, we would not be able to fund the 43 hours the Post Office is open.

We usually host a volunteers get together in the pub every 3 months, and some kind of annual 'thank you' social event to show our appreciation for everything our volunteers do. Unfortunately, all plans for this year's social event and regular volunteer get togethers have had to be put on hold until we are clear of the pandemic.

It was very nice to receive a card from the Lord Lieutenant of North Yorkshire thanking all our volunteers, and lots of customers have commented on how hard everyone has worked during the last few months to keep the shop stocked and open every day. We are a community owned and run shop and certainly proved how essential a local shop and post office is to all of us during recent months.

The shop and post office stayed open throughout lockdown as an essential service, and this saved 200 journeys out of the villages every single day. A truly remarkable effort from all our shop and Good Neighbour volunteers. We will celebrate together at some point! Without masks. With hugs and handshakes!

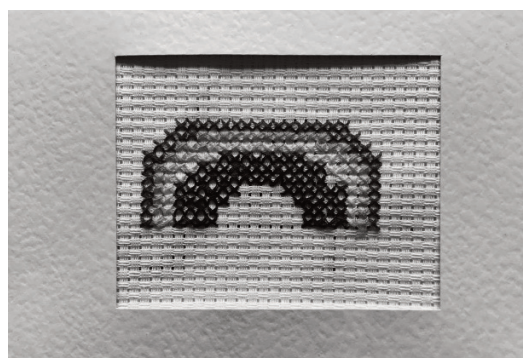

This initiative was quickly followed by the introduction of a food takeaway and delivery service which proved very popular; indeed, Neil and Nikki believe that without your excellent support for this service the pub may not have survived.

Neil and Nikki put in an enormous amount of hard work to prepare the pub for re-opening and as a result the Rose and Crown was near the top of the list of pubs and restaurants in North Yorkshire which were best prepared for re-opening. Following the Grand Re-opening on 4 July the Rose and Crown has traded strongly. As we move towards autumn and we are all getting used to a new "normal" we would like to remind everyone that EDCCA is still here for you.

It is important to follow government guidelines to stay safe. We must be mindful of how this virus is transmitted and guard against it at all times, keeping ourselves and others safe.

There are people in our district who have been particularly careful and are classed as "shielded". They are the ones who received a letter from the government advising them not to go out at all. This has been a tough few months, especially for those people.

The EDCCA volunteers have been helping many of the shielded so they did not have to go out. From 1st August 2020 people who have been shielding were permitted to leave their homes if they chose to.

Not everyone feels comfortable about being out in the community yet, so EDCCA is letting you know that our volunteers are still here to support anyone who would rather keep away from

the shops etc.

Our fantastic team of dedicated volunteers can still collect prescriptions and deliver them to your home, they can still get some shopping in for you, they will still deliver Meals on Wheels 5 days a week, and for those who are feeling a little isolated and out of touch our Telephone Befrienders can ring them up for a chat.

Unfortunately some of our usual projects are on hold at the moment. We are looking at ways of reopening them in a Covid Safe manner. Our Community Car Scheme, Day Centres and Minibus trips will be back as soon as it is safe to bring people together again.

We haven't gone away and are happy to help. Get in touch if you need support and we will all work together through these difficult days.

Sutton-on-the-Forest Playing Field Association

As would be expected there has been little activity on the playing field in recent months. As the country went into lockdown we were advised by Hambleton Borough Council to close the play area, harder said than done when we have open access from three different points. However, signs were duly attached to the play equipment and warning tape was applied to cordon off the equipment. This was then removed later in the year when the Government lifted restrictions allowing outdoor play equipment to be used again. Thanks to all those residents whom stayed clear and resisted the many requests from children in lockdown to go to the park!

It is with regret that this year's Sutton 10k has had to be cancelled. With the current restrictions it was simply not possible to hold the event in a way that would be enjoyable for runners and spectators alike and we ran the risk of severely reduced entries which would also make the event a financial failure. Plans will resume again for 2021.

Also the Covid-19 pandemic meant the spring maintenance day could not be held this year. With a bit of luck, and good attendance and a list of completed activities from the Autumn 2019 maintenance day, the playing field does not appear to have suffered. That said we are planning an Autumn maintenance day and this will be held on **Sunday 27th September at 1pm** (the date of the cancelled Sutton 10k). Please attend if you can and if you have, or have access to, any petrol/battery operated hedge trimmers or chainsaws then these would be useful. There are a couple of overhanging tree branches from a garden neighbouring the play area and the surrounding hedges need trimming. I also have some new nets for the goal posts which can be fitted if the existing ones are deemed past their best.

This year's annual safety inspection has been booked and will be taking place in September. To keep costs down we agree to let Playsafety arrange a day during September whilst suits their inspectors rather than asking for a specific date. I'm confident we will not receive any major actions this year. On a less positive note there have been reports of teenagers on the playing field using bad language, abusing the equipment and generally being unsociable. I'm sure they are not locals as they have been seen leaving the playing field towards the wooded area but it is currently unknown if they are in the area on holiday at one of the caravan parks or are here for another reason. If anyone sees any activity they deem unsociable please let me know.
