Sutton on the Forest Parish Council

Parish Council News

As spring blends into summer the village takes on a softer well cared for appearance and there are a number of well established activities. The annual remembrance service for the Canadian Airmen both those who served at and those who did not return from wartime missions from the airfield at Eastmoor was held at the war memorial at the east end of Main Street on the 10 May and was well attended. Their service and sacrifice was given an added poignancy on this 80th anniversary of VE Day. (see report later - Ed.)

The Parish Council held its annual general meeting on 8th May to elect the office bearers and agree the audit arrangements for the coming municipal year. This was followed by the May ordinary meeting of the council. As well as routine business, including care of the Moorend Nature Reserve, the council considered action to improve footways through the village, upgrading the current speed warning signs to better control speeding traffic, improving village archive storage by digitising the records, and considered improvements to the Parish Council social media presence on the village website and Facebook.

There were no major planning proposals for consultation from North Yorkshire Council though a consultation on the review of the NYC Local Plan review has started. This is a fairly long process but already NYC have asked local landowners to suggest land for development. Such suggestions, and there are a few in the village, will be evaluated and the Parish Council asked to comment on their suitability. Generally, a village like Sutton-on-the-Forest with few facilities and poor public transport would not feature for major development but a few sites which could provide for a range of smaller houses enabling younger families or downsizing may have a role. The Parish Council intends to hold a parish meeting for all residents on the evening of **Wednesday 2nd July** in the Village Hall to discuss this and a number of other pressing topics to get a steer from residents on how to respond and on setting our priorities.

Lastly there are a number of Parish Councillors who are considering or have notified the council of their intention to stand down. This means that there are likely to be vacancies for local councillors. Whilst the next election is not until 2027 volunteers can be co-opted onto the council in the meantime. Anyone interested is strongly encouraged to contact the Parish Clerk who can advise on the role, as can any of the current members of the council.

Spring at the Forest of Flowers, Huby

This spring has brought us some glorious weather, with our wildflower meadows and new woodland constantly bathed in sunshine. This has meant fantastic conditions for pollinators, with our tree blossom, willow and wildflowers out in force, providing an amazing source of nectar and pollen.

On the down side, the dry weather has meant that our 18 ponds are dwindling with some already dry. This could impact our wildlife which relies on a good water level, not least our amphibians, dragonflies and mayflies. Let's hope some rain will be on its way soon.

Butterflies have been one of the main winners from the warm weather lately. Our weekly surveys began in April, and we've seen a significant rise in numbers on last year. (One week in May had more than 3 times the sightings we had in the same week in 2024.) We've also seen more Small Tortoiseshells so far this year than in the whole of 2024!

The icing on the cake has been a brand new butterfly species to the site: **Dingy skipper!** This gives us 25 species and counting. This one breeds on Bird's-foot Trefoil, which is abundant in our meadows (the same reason we saw the return of the Common Blue, which also relies on this wildflower). The Dingy skipper is scarce in the UK and particularly in Yorkshire, so it's fantastic to see it and we hope it makes a permanent home here.



We've had more new arrivals recently, with the birth of our first goat kid for 3 years. Meet Henrietta! She is half Golden Guernsey (now Royal Golden Guernsey), a rare breed which we love. Our small herd of 6 goats give us lovely milk and cheese (plus a bit of mischief now and then!). Our Open Farm Sunday event and general Guided Tours include a visit to see the goats and pigs for anyone who'd like to meet them.



Also in our smallholding are 10 bee hives, which are producing honey at a fantastic rate due to the sunshine and abundance of wildflowers to forage on! We have recently finished our first harvest of the year and have lots of delicious spring honey now in stock. If you'd like some, it's now available at Huby and Sutton Community Shop, and at our events. All funds raised support our project for nature conservation across our 100-acre habitat in Huby.





- If you are unable or unwilling to give rescue breaths just do the compressions continuously.
- Give 30 compressions at a rate of 100-120 per minute and then give 2 breaths.
- Repeat 30 compressions and 2 breaths sequence.
- Continue until help arrives, you are too tired to continue, or the casualty starts breathing normally again.

FOR AN ADULT USE 2 HANDS & COMPRESS 5-6 cm

FOR A CHILD USE 1 HAND & COMPRESS 1/3 CHEST DEPTH FOR AN INFANT USE 2 FINGERS & COMPRESS 1/3 CHEST DEPTH

Tuesday 24 June: A Complete Unknown

In the early 1960s, 19-year-old Bob Dylan arrives in New York with his guitar and revolutionary talent, destined to change the course of American music. Forming his most intimate relationships during his rise to fame, he grows restless with the folk movement, making a controversial choice that reverberates worldwide.

It's a remarkable performance. Star of the moment Timothée Chalamet inhabits the loose-limbed, live-wire physicality of the young Bob Dylan and makes an impressively good fist of capturing the frayed hessian of his distinctive voice. Hit after hummable hit, the soundtrack is a tribute to Dylan's incredible creativity during this period of his career, and the impact the songs had on his audiences (Guardian)



Tuesday 22 July: A Real Pain

A Real Pain is a 2024 comedy-drama film written and directed by Jesse Eisenberg. A coproduction between Poland and the United States, the film stars Eisenberg and Kieran Culkin as mismatched cousins who reunite for a Jewish heritage tour through Poland in honour of their late grandmother, but their old tensions resurface against the backdrop of their family history.

A whip-sharp comedy driven by the rattling verbal sparring between uptight, neurotic David and his outgoing, unpredictable cousin Benji (Guardian) Culkin won an Oscar for his performance but so could Eisenburg for writing, directing and acting.



RAF East Moor Memorial Events

This year's RAF East Moor memorial weekend was again well supported. Three officers from 415 Squadron RCAF made the most of their stay before the Memorial Service itself. They were able to visit Stonefall Cemetery and Betty's tearoom, famous for its wartime mirrors. However, their visits to Sutton Park, kindly hosted by Robert Sheffield, and the Primary School in Sutton on the Forest were undoubtedly individual highlights. At the school, they were able to explain to the children their significant historical connection to the village and answer the children's many varied questions, while also distributing lots of Air Force stickers.

On the Saturday, the Memorial Service was well attended and allowed for an appropriate period of reflection, honour and remembrance for the many who had served from RAF East Moor.

Around a hundred people were in attendance, with many representatives from both veteran and uniformed organisations, as well as the local villages surrounding the old RAF East Moor. The East Moor family and the villagers of Sutton on the Forest were very pleased to welcome all who took part or attended, but in particular, the

three officers RCAF from 415, who were able to experience some of the heritage and history of RAF East Moor. After the service, a delicious afternoon tea in the Grey Village Hall was kindly provided by the Yorkshire Country Women's Association.

The three Canadian officers then moved on to visit a site in Helperby and Brafferton, where there is a memorial marking the site where a Halifax Bomber was shot down by a German fighter aircraft as they returned to their base at RAF Dishforth. The crew consisted of six Canadian and one British aircrew. All were killed, and it is shocking how young they were. A visit to Tholthorpe Control Tower (with the kind permission of the owners who have converted the property into a very individual house) concluded their afternoon.

From the Parish Council and myself, thank you in equal measure to those who took part and to those who were able to attend and support these events.



SUTTON ON THE FOREST YCA

There was a good turnout for our March meeting, of members who had come to hear Susan Woodcock talk about her extraordinary life. Some readers may already know of Sue as she writes a weekly column for The Yorkshire Post. An accomplished entertainer, in the classic style of an after dinner speaker, she proved herself to be a true raconteur. Her booming voice and engaging manner had us transfixed by hair raising tales, and laugh out loud stories of her sometimes outrageous antics.

Born in 1949, Sue was abandoned by her parents and raised by her grandmother. On leaving education she entered the police force and after a long and varied career, plus a number of husbands, retired and moved to Settle where she became a sheep farmer. However it was not enough to keep her busy mind occupied and so she took on a dizzying array of varied jobs and hobbies including caving and pot holing, scoring for the local cricket club, singing in a various choirs, a number of jobs in security, and also writing. After a back injury, she sold the farm in Cumbria and moved to Pocklington. Now, as well as giving regular talks to groups, she amuses herself by killing off the people she dislikes - by writing them into her murder mysteries. She has a whole series of published who-done-it's, all set in Yorkshire.

In April members were delighted to welcome Kevin Hutchinson, who had come all the way from Scarborough to talk to us about Yorkshire Air Ambulance. Kevin gave us a professional, whistle-stop presentation, a little heavy perhaps on technical and mechanical details, but thankfully accompanied by lots of slides of shiny yellow helicopters. Actually, there were plenty of interesting details that stick more easily in the memory. YAA is a rapid response emergency service that attends four or five incidents a day and covers over five million people. From its two bases it can reach 90% of Yorkshire in a maximum of 20 minutes. It is an independent charity run by a board of trustees, but relies on hundreds of volunteers, and this year is its 25th Anniversary. YAA is a support service that it is hard to imagine managing without. But in a similar fashion to hospices, they survive with very little government or commercial support and exist almost entirely on the generosity of the general public and the hard work and dedication of their loyal and committed volunteers.

Unfortunately I was unable to attend our May meeting, but I understand that as usual, it was a most enjoyable evening. Rosemary Cook was the guest speaker and she had come to talk about the relatively unknown crimes of Dr Gramshaw. Apparently, Dr Gramshaw was a successful family doctor for 35 years in Yorkshire, until his final desperate actions brought his professional and personal life crashing down around him at Easter in 1908. Rosemary shared the findings of her detailed local research to present an astonishing true story of crimes and lies, success and deceit, adultery, bigamy and insanity. With a background in nursing and healthcare, Rosemary writes books about historical true crime with a nursing or medical connection. The YCA first met Rosemary when we presented a cheque to her in her role as head of a women's charity in York, and she is a very remarkable and interesting woman. I also managed to miss (whilst in the south of England cuddling by newborn grandson), the annual memorial service for the Royal Canadian Airforce. The YCA once again were delighted to provide afternoon tea following the service for all guests, visitors and attendees. I am told that there were many compliments from the various visitors who all seemed to enjoy the relaxed atmosphere.

stallation of the new swings and replacement of the high beams on the agility trail was completed at the end of March and both items are now back in use. Since the swings were installed, we have probably had the driest few weeks to remember, which didn't help the new turf/seeded areas to take but, I'm glad to say the grass is now growing well. Unfortunately, there have been a couple of incidents on the playing field recently, the latest incident resulting in the small table within the toddler's playhouse getting damaged. If it were not for a kind resident in the village removing the damaged table, the long screws protruding from the broken table could have caused injury to any children playing within it. This type of behaviour is very disappointing and can be costly and time consuming for the playing field committee to repair. Certified children's play equipment is not cheap, the new swings, for example, cost over £6,000 and took a considerable effort from the playing field committee and volunteers to arrange and prepare for. We hope this behaviour does not



continue. By the time of publication of the Sutton Times the table should have been repaired, along with replacement of a few of the low stepping logs of the agility trail which have become damaged due to rot.

A small number of volunteers met early April for the spring maintenance day. We treated the picnic tables near to the BBQ and cut back some of the perimeter hedge. Many thanks to those that gave up a few hours of their Sunday afternoon. The next maintenance day will be in autumn, please look out for details within the next edition of the Sutton Times and posters displayed around the village. The autumn maintenance day generally requires more volunteers than in spring as we deal with the summer growth of the trees and hedges surrounding the field so we hope you can join us.

Plans for this year's Sutton 10k are underway, which is being held on - Sunday 28th September @11:00

This is the main event for the playing field and raises significant funds to enable the space to be kept safe and looking good. Nearer the time we will be requesting help from residents to set up the equipment on the field and the course, marshal the event and pack everything away afterwards.
