Parish Council News

As this issue of Sutton Times goes out, we can begin to look forward to Spring with the current unseasonably mild temperatures and the snowdrops in prolific full bloom. Admittedly, the mild weather has come at a price in terms of wind and rain. However, not with the 70 mph wind gusts that we experienced with storm Eowyn in January. There was some superficial damage locally due to that storm; broken fences and a few fallen trees, but we escaped lightly compared with areas further to the North and West. Carr Lane was closed for about an hour, and we would like to thank the local driver of a "front loader" who removed the fallen tree very quickly and efficiently, allowing the road to reopen.

Tree Survey

We now have the report following the routine tree survey of trees that are the responsibility of the Parish Council. Further maintenance will be carried out as a result. However, there may well be additional damage, that has occurred post survey, as a consequence of the recent high winds. If you happen to spot any trees that have sustained damage that could become a potential risk, please let us know.



Jubilee Oak

Our beautiful Jubilee Oak tree in the centre of the village suffered significant storm damage in September. Work was carried out to remove the broken branch in the hope of protecting the tree from further damage, as well as in the interest of safety. The oak was inspected again as part of our recent tree survey, which revealed that the fracture had advanced further down the tree. Without further work it was likely that the crown would fail and the tree would need to be felled. We were advised to remove the remaining 'leader' branch in order to save the tree. This work has now been done. Every effort was made to avoid unduly detracting from the appearance of our Jubilee Oak.

Moor End

Residents who walk through Moor End will have noticed that the path has now been dressed with wood chips for almost its entire length. A wooden retaining edge has been fitted where necessary to prevent the chips washing away "down slope". The surface seems to have coped well with the rainy periods. The water table is currently very high and the ponds quite full.

The large pond is almost completely free of the invasive Azolla growth, and the smaller one near Well Lane only has some sparse cover around the edges. It is hoped that the North American Weevil population, introduced last year, will have hibernated successfully during this Winter and will emerge hungry, in the Spring, should the Azolla expand again.

North Yorkshire Local Plan

The creation of the new unitary authority demands that a local plan be developed to cover development for the whole area. This will replace individual plans currently in place, for the old District Councils and will specify development for the next 15 to 20 years. The creation process is lengthy, taking approximately 3 years, with the objective of having the new plan in place by 2028. The team responsible for the plan has recently invited landowners to submit details of land that might be developed. The submissions will be examined by the team and a short list of sites will be created that are considered to meet overall planning policy for the area.

Our Parish Council will be asked to comment on short listed sites in our Parish.

With this in mind, it is proposed to include the Local Plan as one of the topics for the next Annual Parish Meeting (Date of this meeting to be agreed). It is hoped that the ensuing discussion will allow residents to express their views regarding development in and around the village.

Home to School transport funding policy

North Yorkshire County Council has changed the home to school transport policy. Students attending secondary school from September 2025 now have to attend their closest secondary school and not their primary school's catchment secondary school if they wish to qualify for travel funding from the Council. If you are concerned about this issue, please contact the Parish Clerk, who can provide some additional information.

Bus Service

As many residents will have realised, our local number 40 bus service is now provided by Transdev: York and Country, following the sale of the route by Reliance. The Parish Council would like to express its thanks to Reliance for the excellent service provided for so many years.

The only noticeable change seems to be the gradual adoption of a blue livery for the buses.

The Sunday service is funded by North Yorkshire County Council and will continue for the present.

RCAF Memorial Event - May 10th 2025

Three Royal Canadian Air Force officers who are already located at bases in the UK have committed to attending the memorial service on May 10th. As was the case last year, funding is uncertain, at present, for members of 415 squadron in Canada to travel to the UK for this event. However, it is still possible that somebody may travel from Canada.

Winter at the Forest of Flowers

The last few months have seen some spectacular sights at the Forest of Flowers in Huby. Very low temperatures turned the habitat into a crisp winter wonderland, with some amazing natural beauty making the conditions all the more bearable to work in! A very cold week saw stunning ice formations on our ponds (pictured).

The wildlife has been out in force even in winter, with plenty of bird life foraging across the habitat here. Taking part in the RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch, we saw 15 species and 49

individuals within an hour. Blue tits were most common (x13) with Chaffinches a close second (x10), and some lovely sightings of Goldcrest (x1), Bullfinch (x4) and Redpoll (x1). We also had a Sparrowhawk try its best to disrupt our survey!

Volunteering

Our team of volunteers have accomplished an incredible amount this season - stoic in the adverse weather. No week has been the same, with tasks including willow coppicing, tree guard collection and setting up a new area for our 3 pigs to roam.

If you'd like to grow some stunning wildflowers to help our native wildlife, the recommended sowing season is just around the corner (March - May). We offer locally-grown seeds, hand-collected from our 100-acres of meadows in Huby. Our online Seed Shop has various seed mixes, plus 50+ individual wildflower species, and we will have potted plants available from April/May. 





Closely based on Claire Keegan's novel, this moving film tells the story of Bill Furlong, a coalman in a small town in Ireland. He works hard for his family but seems preoccupied. If you have visited the Surgery recently you will have noticed that music is now being played in the Waiting Room. Hopefully this is not too intrusive.

Due to our space limitations, music is being used to provide a degree of confidentiality to patients at reception or on the phone to our receptionists.

To aid confidentiality further, it would be appreciated if patients queueing at reception could stand back to allow other patients a degree of privacy.

If as a patient you feel a need for greater privacy than afforded at reception, please ask to be seen in a private room.

Use of NHS APP

If you are comfortable using Mobile phone, iPad, Laptop or Computer Apps we would actively encourage you to maximise the use of the NHS App.

You can use the NHS App to view and manage prescriptions, order repeat prescriptions, check availability of appointments and book a time/date, see results and history from ether GP or hospital tests, see history of letters on file and much, much more.

Your increased use of NHS App reduces the workload and time pressures on our Surgery Staff, saves you time and puts more information at your fingertips.

One of our PPG members, Chris, is available to help you start or enhance the use of your NHS APP on a one-to-one basis.

All "training" sessions are from 14.00 to 16.00 hours and dates are: -Friday 28th March, Friday 2nd May, Friday 6th June

Please let the Surgery know if you wish to attend a particular training session to assist our resource planning. When attending, please bring along your own device to be used for NHS APP access. Further dates and/or times can be provided if necessary.

Patients who cannot or do not wish to use the NHS App can still make prescription requests and GP/ Nurse appointments in the current way.


Solar Power & Electric Vehicle Chargers


