Parish Council News

The last three months in the village have been particularly quiet. The Huby and Sutton Agricultural Show was postponed for one year as a result of the difficulties that the Farming Sector and associated rural industries are experiencing, including the impact of Blue Tongue and Avian Influenza. The Huby and Sutton Agricultural Society committee has announced that it is looking forward to welcoming everyone back in 2026.

The Magpies festival took place earlier this month. This was the fourth year that the festival has been held and was again a great success, with tickets apparently sold out before the event. Planning for the 2026 event is already underway.

The Parish Council held a parish meeting at the beginning of July. Amongst other topics that we aired was the recurrent problem of speeding motorists in the village. In 2021, the parish council purchased two mobile vehicle-activated signs (MVASs). Although some may question the effectiveness of these signs, manufacturers have data that proves they reduce speeding motorists by 25%.

The intention was to relocate these signs among three different village sites to maximise their impact on speeding motorists. The signs are pretty bulky, and relocating them between sites has proven more challenging than anticipated.

Therefore, the parish council has decided to buy a further third sign and add solar panels to each sign so that the batteries do not need to be recharged regularly. This should enable us to gather more data from each sign, which we will be able to pass to the North Yorkshire Police as we see fit.

The Parish Council has received a request for property owners to keep their hedges cut back, ensuring there is ample space on the pavement for pushchairs and wheelchair users. Ideally, the hedges should extend no more than a few inches over the pavement.

As many of you will be aware, Don and Judy Rankin are in the process of moving home, and Don has informed the parish council that when he moves, he will need to resign. We want to thank Don for all his hard work and his expertise with planning applications. We wish Don and Judy every happiness in the future with their move to York.


The Ballad of Wallis Island is an affecting comedy that contemplates the pains and pleasures of a musical career in free fall (BFI)

Sutton on the Forest Playing Field Association

Despite being temporarily postponed by one of the heaviest downpours we've had in months, two PFA members and I replaced a couple of rotten low stepping logs and repaired the broken table in the toddler's playhouse late July. Thanks to both PFA members for your help.

The Autumn maintenance day will be held on Sunday 21st September at 1pm, meet on the playing field. We usually time the Autumn maintenance day to occur a week or two before the Sutton 10k to enable any activities required to hold the Sutton 10k, such as cutting back any tree branches or hedges, to be done. There are several parts of the course, including the path between Sutton Park and the woods, which are overgrown and will require cutting back/widening. If you can help us, even if you can only spare 1 hour, it is greatly appreciated. Success of the Sutton 10k relies on a number of volunteers otherwise it simply would not be viable to hold. Similarly, general maintenance of the playing field relies on volunteers, leaving any funds raised by the annual Sutton 10k to be used for new equipment, such as the recent junior swings, or more 'technical' repairs. Attendance at the maintenance days have been minimal in recent years and this does limit the activities which can be completed. If you are able to join us please bring any general gardening tools and we especially need any battery or petrol-powered tools, such as hedge trimmers, strimmers and chainsaws, due to there being no power available on the playing field

We also have the annual RoSPA inspection in either September or October. We leave the date flexible, to be decided by Playsafety, as this reduces costs. So, if you see someone on the playing field in the coming month or two with clipboard in hand then this is what it is likely to be for.

Plans for this year's Sutton 10k are well underway, which is being held on Sunday 28th September @11:00. This is the main event for the playing field and raises significant funds to enable the space to be kept safe and looking good. If you have previously helped and are willing to do so again then please reply promptly to any e-mails you receive. If you are new to the village, or have not helped before, but are willing to help, please call or message me on my number below with your e-mail address. We need help setting up the field and course on the Saturday prior to the event, marshalling the event and packing everything away afterwards. We hope you will join us in supporting this important event. We will also be asking for donations of cakes, buns and all things sweet for the famous tea tent which will be run by the Sutton on the Forest Church of England Primary School with all proceeds from the tea tent going to the school.

The sub remains at the very reasonable £10 for eight monthly talks alternating between Huby and Sutton and several outings (maybe with a small extra charge). There are concessions for the over 80's and students go free. One of the outings will



be to a distant garden with a "free to members bus". Jill Ward is the speaker on September 24th and she will tell us about the gardens at Burnby Hall. They are much, much bigger and a lot more interesting than when I first came to Sutton! Speakers are always experts on their topic and frequently bring plants for sale they have raised themselves, all at a reasonable price and advice on how to grow them well.

One of the year's talks is on "Gardening Disasters". We've all had our those. 
We look forward to seeing you on the 24th September. As there are over sixty members from both villages-and outside them as well, there's bound to be someone you know.

If someone collapses, follow these instructions





ADDITIONAL COMPRESSION/BREATHING INFORMATION

- If you are unable or unwilling to give rescue breaths just do the compressions continuously.
- Give 30 compressions at a rate of 100-120 per minute and then give 2 breaths.
- Repeat 30 compressions and 2 breaths sequence.
- Continue until help arrives, you are too tired to continue, or the casualty starts breathing normally again.

FOR AN ADULT USE 2 HANDS & COMPRESS 5-6 cm

FOR A CHILD USE 1 HAND & COMPRESS 1/3 CHEST DEPTH FOR AN INFANT USE 2 FINGERS & COMPRESS 1/3 CHEST DEPTH

Sutton-on-the-Forest Telephone Box Defibrillator

Time flies and it is 6 years already since our community defibrillator was installed in the phone box in the Main Street. In this position, it is centrally located in the village and close to where people congregate and gather in the pub, playground, school and church. The Parish Council have asked me to write an update to remind residents of the defib's location, purpose and use.

The defibrillator is very carefully monitored and maintained, and there is a strict governance system in place. John Barrass and I remain the appointed community caretakers. We have a quick look in the telephone box each time we pass, but once a month we carry out a formal check of all the equipment and then submit a site check report on the online governance system. The device also contains a microchip which records how much electricity it uses, the expiry dates of all its consumable parts and details of when and how it is used. Each time the defibrillator is removed from its cabinet (which can only be done with guidance from the ambulance service), the ambulance service takes it off line and out of use. It is not re-listed as available until John or I have checked it over, replaced any used parts, completed a new site check report, and listed it as 'Rescue Ready'.

This means that it is essential that anyone who removes it from its cabinet, whether it is used or not, informs John or myself

Our details are below, inside the cabinet and now inside the telephone kiosk too

Community defibrillators are designed to be used by members of the public, with or without any formal training, but they are not a magic wand. Good first aid and CPR are still what is needed to keep a patient alive until the defib and/or the ambulance service arrive. Our defib is registered with the ambulance service, so if you dial 999 and are with someone who has collapsed and appears not to be breathing, they will know if you are within range of the defib. They will give you the code for the locked cabinet so that you can access the defib, only if the person you are with is unconscious and there is someone else with you, as the patient must not be left unattended.

You do not need to know or remember any of the above. If you dial 999 the ambulance service will tell you exactly what to do. The defibrillator gives audio instructions from the machine. You can do no harm; the defib will not administer a shock if it detects a heart beat. However if possible, CPR is still required to sustain the patient until the defib or ambulance arrives; or if you are alone or not within range of a defib.

In March 2020, The Community Heartbeat Trust facilitated a free, community Cardiac Arrest Response Seminar in the Church Room. The 2 hour seminar covered cardiac arrest - what it is and what to do, CPR, and demonstrated use of defibrillators explaining how the equipment works and its benefits to the community in saving precious minutes in the treatment of sudden cardiac arrest. It was very well attended and folks commented on how very enlightening and helpful it was. It was a while ago now and things get forgotten, so we are hoping to organise another one, perhaps in the Autumn. For me, there were 3 stand out facts from the seminar:-

- 1. You do not need to know anything to use the defib, or even read instructions when you are panicking the machine gives audio instructions.
- 2. The ambulance call operator will not send you to get the defibrillator if you are alone as it is essential that good quality CPR is done to keep the patient's blood pumping until help arrives. The patient must not under any circumstances be left unattended.
- 3. It is good CPR that saves live.

In short:-

- If you are with someone who has collapsed call 999
- Check whether they are breathing. If not dial 999 if you haven't done already and begin CPR
- Send someone if available to get the community defibrillator
- Do not leave the patient unattended
- Continue chest compressions until the ambulance and/or defib arrive

Please keep your appointment

Recently we have not been able to offer patients an appointment with our Nursing team as quickly as we usually would. This has been due to several factors but one of the most significant is the number of missed appointments and late cancellations within our Nursing Team. During June and July we encountered a total of 13.5 hours of missed Nursing appointments due to patients simply failing to attend and over 4 hours of appointments cancelled at such short notice that we were unable to re-book the slot. This has resulted in some patients having either had to wait longer or travel further afield for blood tests.

Please always try to attend your appointment and if you are genuinely unable to do so please cancel well in advance wherever possible. Appointments can be cancelled on the NHS APP at any time or by phoning the Surgery during Opening Hours.

Online Consultations and Admin Requests

In addition to traditional consulting methods, we now offer the option to consult online with the Surgery. This online option provides greater flexibility as your request form can be completed at any time of day avoiding the need to wait for opening hours and time spent queuing on the telephone. The online consultation option can be accessed from the home page of our website and is particularly useful for requesting sick notes, ordering acute medication, reporting medication concerns and administrative queries.

Online consultations will not replace traditional consulting methods but are an additional method of supporting both the ever-increasing demands on our Surgery and the busy lives of our patients. Thank you for your support.

Our seed harvest is in full swing and we've been busy in the meadows hand-collecting from lots of species, including Yellow Rattle, Bird's-Foot Trefoil and Cowslip. The next sowing season (Sept - Oct) brings an opportunity for everyone to support biodiversity in the area by growing wildflowers.


